


- 8. **Mentoring and Support:** Provide access to mentors and tutors who can offer guidance, encouragement, and support outside the classroom.


Supporting Black Adolescent Males

Through collaboration and a commitment to supporting Black adolescent males, we can create a society where all students have the opportunity to reach their full potential and thrive in a literacy-rich world.



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
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
