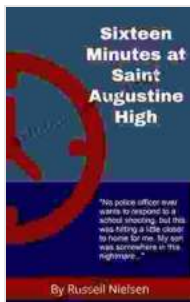


Exploring Sixteen Minutes at Saint Augustine High: A Deep Dive into the Haunting True Story

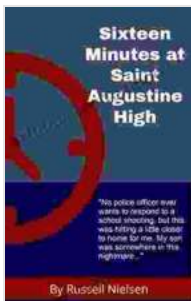

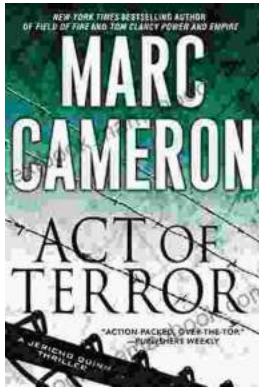
