
## The Lollipop Man: The Extraordinary Life of Jean Boase Beier

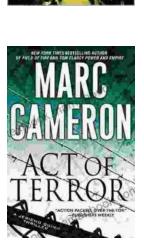
